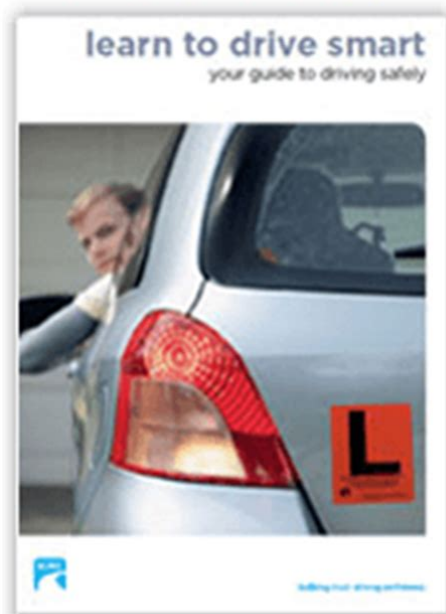

A computerized knowledge test requiring a mark of at least 83.3% as well as a vision test must be passed to obtain this licence. Restrictions on the Class 7 licence include zero blood alcohol content while driving and the inability to drive between midnight and 5 am. Class 7 drivers may operate mopeds without an accompanying driver. A consent form must be signed by a parent or guardian for an applicant under the age of 18. The minimum age to obtain this licence is 16. A Class 7 licence must have been held for one year before it is possible to apply for a Class 6 licence. A learner holding a Class 7 licence must not drive a motorcycle during the night defined as one hour after sunset, until 5 am or one hour before sunrise, whichever is later. Learners with a Class 7 or Class 5 Probationary licence may not operate or sit on a motorcycle with a blood alcohol content greater than zero. Learners with a Class 5 nonprobationary or higher licence Class 1, 2, 3, or 4 have no restrictions except that a supervising rider must be present. In addition, the driver must be 16 years of age before he or she may apply for this licence. This licence allows one to drive without an accompanying fully licensed driver. However, this licence has more restrictions than a nonprobationary licence. Fewer demerit points are allowed and drivers must have zero blood alcohol content while driving. A probationary licence does not qualify the licenceholder to serve as an accompanying driver for a Class 7 driver. A basic road test is required to obtain this licence. The minimum age to obtain this licence is 18. An advanced road test must be passed to obtain this licence.It is not shown on the Class 1 licence because all Class 1 drivers licensed in Alberta are required to have attended an approved Air Brake course; a Class 1 operators licence cannot be obtained without

Note The written knowledge test for Class 1 can be taken prior to having attended an Air Brake course; however, driver training can not commence until after the course is completed. A person holding this licence must be accompanied by a fully licensed driver over 25. They may have one additional passenger besides the supervisor. The driver must maintain a bloodalcohol count of zero i.e. none in their blood, display a large L decal on the back of their vehicle, have no more than two passengers including the supervisor, and must not drive between 12AM and 5AM. Use of electronic devices is prohibited. The 7L licence is good for two years. After 12 months, the driver may take a 35minute driving test to advance to the next level. A Class 7N licence is good for five years, and the stage takes a minimum of two years to complete unless the person graduates from an accredited driving course, which reduces the length of time required to 18 months. Drivers must display a large N decal on the back of their vehicle. After two years with the Class 7N, the licenceholder may take the 45minute Class 5 road test. Successful completion of this test grants a Class 5 passenger vehicle licence. It has no additional restrictions, unlike the Class 7 licences. Minimum age 16. Must maintain 0 BAC. Passengers are permitted during the day but between 12am and 5am, the Level II driver must be accompanied by a licensed driver with 4 years driving experience and cannot have any other passengers in the vehicle. The drivers blood alcohol content must remain at 0% in this stage. A minimum of 1 year with a class 5 licence is required before one can apply for a commercial class licence. The G1 licence allows the learning driver to drive on roads accompanied by a full G licence driver with four years of driving experience whose blood alcohol content BAC is less than 0.05. Proof of four years experience is indicated on a licence with four dots. The driver cannot drive between 12 AM and 5 AM, and must not drive with a BAC above zero.

Furthermore, a G1 driver may not drive on any of the following unless accompanied by a licensed instructor After successfully completing a basic road test, a G2 driver may drive without an accompanying driver at any time and on all Ontario roads and highways. The driver must still maintain a BAC of zero and restrict passengers to the number of working seatbelts. With successful completion, they will obtain a full licence, which carries no restrictions. Drivers aged 22 and over are permitted to drive with a maximum of 0.08 BAC, though roadside suspensions may be enforced above 0.05 BAC. Drivers 80 and over must complete a vision and knowledge test and participate in a

Testing Requirements for a Drivers Licence are a written or oral exam, road sign, driving, vision test and Novice Driving or Driver Education Course is required for firsttime drivers. An eye test is required if a licence is expired more than one year. The classes of licence that can be obtained with appropriate training and required testing are as follows To obtain this licence one must pass a multiple choice road theory test. The permit issued allows the learning driver to drive on roads accompanied by someone with a full valid drivers licence. While driving, the learner must maintain a 0% blood alcohol content level and is limited to 4 demerit points, which when reached, incurs a 3month suspension and extension of the learning period by the same amount of time.

Control means remaining calm and at ease behind the wheel while conducting smooth movements of the vehicle on the road and within traffic. The goal of a good driver is to disrupt traffic as little as possible. You should become highly skilled at identifying situations that require your attention, anticipating and predicting what other drivers might do, deciding on your response and then executing your decision. Make sure you have the knowledge and the ability to control your vehicle so a small error never turns into a dangerous situation. You should be able to control your vehicle in emergencies, in a variety of weather situations, as well as on varying road conditions including very slippery or icy surfaces. Driving is one of the few activities almost everyone practises frequently. You have the choice of being a sloppy, dangerous driver, or one who drives with precision, control and safety.

However, only the Superintendent of Motor Vehicles and his delegates have the authority to make driver fitness licensing decisions. Those decisions are informed by medical information and the role that physicians and other medical practitioners play in driver

fitness assessment is important. The driver will be required to have their physician or nurse practitioner complete the DMER. Incomplete information may result in RoadSafetyBC requesting that the driver return to their physician for additional information. RoadSafetyBC staff will review the completed DMER and any other information on the patient's driving record. If RoadSafetyBC is unable to make a determination on the basis of the information provided, RoadSafetyBC may request additional information or require your patient to undergo further medical or functional assessments e.g. Enhanced Road Assessment ERA, occupational therapist assessment, or ICBC road test reexamination. ICBC will also send a followup letter advising the driver that their driver's licence has been revoked. There are many age-associated medical conditions which can affect driving including dementias where, even in its mild and moderate forms, increase crash risk by anywhere between two and eight times. When cognitive impairment is progressive, those affected by it will eventually have to stop driving at some point. Drivers aged 80 and older are also involved in more crashes per kilometre driven than almost any other age group, and are also much more likely to die in those crashes. Driving cessation is inevitable at some point when the medical condition is progressive. When you, as a medical professional, have a patient whom you suspect has a cognitive impairment, driving issues should be addressed as soon as possible. Your patient and their caregivers need time to plan for the loss of driving privileges. All of your clinical observations should be included in your report to RoadSafetyBC. For example, a language barrier could influence a patient to score lower than their true ability. Conversely, a highly intelligent patient could score higher than their true ability. In these cases, a screening tool should not be solely relied upon for licensing decisions. In such circumstances, document on the report to RoadSafetyBC that the screening results may not be valid based on your clinical opinion, and provide your clinical observations and recommendations. In realworld driving, drivers need to selfnavigate without assistance and adapt to unexpected changes in a familiar route. Unlike a traditional road test where the driver is guided in a structured environment, the ERA has tasks that are similar to the cognitive workload of realworld driving. The driver's ability to complete these tasks and simultaneously maintain the basic driving skills are evaluated by the driver examiner. The ERA consists of a pretrip vehicle orientation, onroad drive with a feedback component, and a posttrip review.

The results of the ERA are reviewed by RoadSafetyBC and considered along with all other relevant information in the driver's file to make a licensing decision.
